



Poverty Status According to Annual Household Income

Public Health Emergency Impacts MA and MNCare Recipients

The Pulic Health Emergency continued into 2022 and the state did not require MA and MNCare recipents to complete the renewal process. However, these receipents still needed help navigating the process Over 400, people worked with WCCA's MNsure Navigators for coaching and advice.



WIC Helps Navigate the Formula Recall

Families felt the pain of the 2022 Similac formula recall at every socioeconomic level. The State WIC Association was able to to expand the substitution lists, but it was still difficult for people to find formula at all. One WIC client was told that it would take 6 months for her order of specialty formula to be filled. The WCCA WIC staff were able to help navigate the process and get the order in just two weeks.



Changing Food Shelf Demographics



Revenue


